The Big Lick

Hello, my name is Orla, and today I am going to be talking to you about 'The Big Lick'.

Now I know you are all probably thinking, "What on earth is The Big Lick?!" Well, that is why I am going to be explaining what this is and why it is so awful. Unfortunately, this type of animal abuse tends to be something people don't talk or think about much.





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
